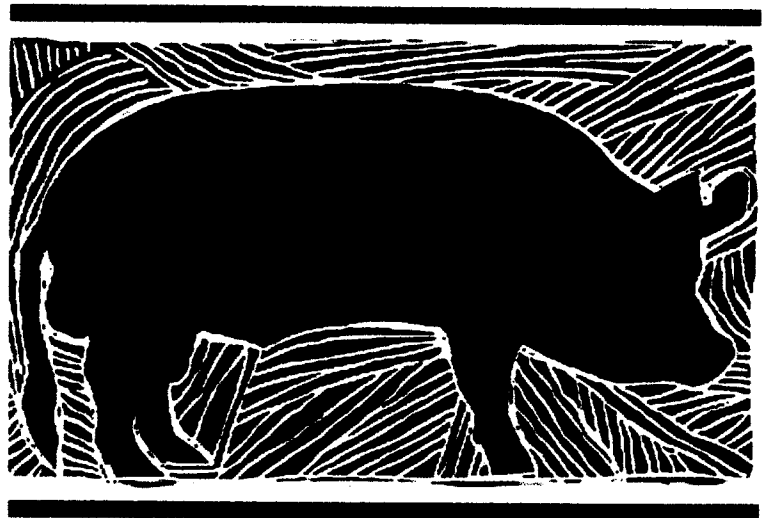

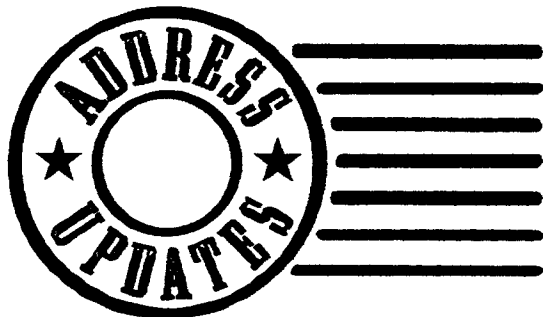
Congratulations!

Be In That Place

If you've been in worship over the past month, you may have noticed that I've added a new invitation as we enter into prayer. I say something along the lines of, "Be in that place where you feel close to God, and where God feels close to you."

Staying spiritually, emotionally, and cognitively close to God is our primary task as followers of Jesus. It is also our main resource as we navigate life, and it can also be our main strength as we go through life's ups and downs.

One way to look at the complete narrative we find in the Bible is a story of God longing and working to be close to God's creation, particularly us as humanity. We see this divine longing take on radical form in the incarnation of Jesus. Through Jesus, we intimately experience Emmanuel, God with us. God willingly and out of deep love took on flesh, so that we could be in unending relationship with God.

Through the mysterious work of the Holy Trinity, Creator, Christ, and Holy Spirit, each one of us is invited to the thin places where we feel God close to us and where we feel close to God. Now, those thin places look different for each and every one of us. They can be planned or completely unexpected. They can involve set rituals or can be spontaneous. They can be with other people or they can be in solitude.

I encourage each of us to make it a priority to spend time in those moments when we feel close to God. For some, that may be a time of quiet prayer in an isolated place. For some, there may be a lot of noise and energy involved. It may be in church, or it may be in the middle of the prairie.

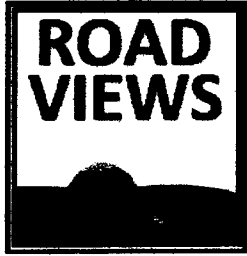
Whatever your thin place looks like, cultivate it and practice it regularly. Because each one of us desperately needs God.

When you find yourself feeling God's presence, hold on to that moment. Remember that moment. Learn from that moment. That moment will be a guide and a resource for you in your journey with God.

When you are anxious and stressed, go to that place where you feel God close to you. When you need to rejoice and give thanks, go to that place where you feel close to God. That place is where you will find life, peace, and fulfillment.

Dear Friends,

During Bishop Elaine Stanovsky's first year in the Rocky Mountain Conference, she issued a challenge to "Be creative. Take risks. Don't be afraid to try new things. Fail!" Most of the clergy who heard this were taken aback by that last one. Weren't we supposed to be successful?

Bishop Elaine shared that she was more interested in our faithfulness. Her experience was that such faithfulness in following Jesus would lead us to practices of risk-taking, trial, error (aka "failure"), learning and eventually... fruitfulness.

She invited us to share our failures in the future. So, the next time I saw her, I told her all about Salida UMC's efforts to minister to the raft guides who worked the Arkansas river during the summer. A small group had met for months, planning an outdoor worship/prayer group. We put together a lovely ministry plan, did some creative partnership (with the community's LDS missionaries among others), got outside the church's box by developing a Facebook page and experimented like crazy. We launched our evening ministry and the planning team met all summer long at our carefully chosen location... without ever making a single invitation to a raft guide to join us, much less getting one to attend. If all we had wanted to do was have meaningful small group time, it would've been awesome. But in terms of actually achieving our stated purpose of "ministry with raft guides," it was a spectacular failure.

The Bishop's response? "That's GREAT!" (Really???) I was stunned that she was genuinely excited by this story.) "What have you learned?" (Among other things, don't hold outreach events in places where you can't be seen.) "What's your plan for the next phase of this experiment?" (Umm... next? What do you mean, "next"? We tried and we failed, doesn't that mean we're done???)

Nope. When it comes to risk-taking experimentation in ministry, "done" is a concept that never really enters the conversation. Instead, there is assessment of how things have gone, discovering what this teaches us and applying our learning to the next attempt.

Bishop Elaine's attitude taught me that the "negative" results of "unsuccessful" efforts that used to make me feel badly, weren't indictments of my character or abilities. They were simply information. The most important lesson I learned through that foray into the land of ministry experimentation, was that grace made ALL the difference.

My friends, I encourage you to let God's perfect love cast out all your fears (1 John 4:18a)... especially your fears of failure! Instead, let the grace of Jesus Christ give you a spirit of hope and perseverance as you experiment in your neighborhood with new ways to offer the love and life of Christ to a hurting world.

So get out there and fail! Be sure to tell me all about it.
